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
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

On India-Pak Zero Line, villagers took the boat to vote

Living on the edge, residents of villages located on the Zero Line of the India-Pakistan border in Ferozepur constituency expect little change in their fortunes after the elections.

With the mighty Sutlej flowing on three sides and Pakistan on the fourth, these villagers have borne the brunt of the two Indo-Pakistan wars since Independence. They work in their fields that lie between the barbed wire fencing erected by the Indian government and the border with Pakistan under the hawk eyes of the BSF. They are forced to strictly follow the limited working hours.

"Nothing has changed here on ground since Independence. Nor do we think anything is going to change," Jagtar Singh of Gatti Rajo Ke village told The Tribune, adding that leaders of all colours, shapes and sizes come to ask for their votes during the polling season, make tall promises, only to forget them as soon as the polls are over.

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Many villages like Kaluwala still do not have road access and makeshift boats, or

collapsed and fields were buried under the sand. "What to talk about compensation, no one even came to visit us," said Kulwinder, who owns two acres of land.

Almost 20 families from Kaluwala shifted out. From a strength of 300 odd voters, the village is down to just over half, only 157 voters.

When Punjab voted on Saturday, the BSF used the

"beras" to get those among the 157 men and women who wanted to vote to the nearest polling booth.

The villagers complain that it's no use being educated, that graduating from the local high school leads to a dead-end, not to freedom. Parveen Bala, Kamaljit Kaur and Manjit Kaur completed their Grade XII this year but must return to the fields to work. "We have no choice. We wanted to further study, but we don't have the resources," said Kamaljit.

"We work in the chilly fields and get only four rupees per kg which means we earn only Rs 200 or 250 daily. Given the inflation, this is not enough to even survive. We had desperately hoped that the government would have set up a stitching centre or computer centre so that we could be employed better," said Manjit Kaur of Bhanewala.

"Last time, we voted for Sukhbir Badal of the Shiromani Akali Dal with such hope, but all our hopes are dashed now. Whether A wins or B, it does not matter much," said Maggar, a daily wageer.

Monsoon floods, landslip kill 14 in Sri Lanka; schools shut

Flash floods, mudslides and falling trees have killed at least 14 persons in Sri Lanka as the island nation is battered by monsoon storms, the country's disaster centre said on Sunday.

Some drowned, including three members of the same family swept away near the capital Colombo.

Others were buried alive in mudslides, including an 11-year-old girl and a 20-year-old man, the Disaster Management Centre (DMC) said.

Nine other persons were crushed and killed when trees fell on them in seven districts since the monsoon intensified on May 21, the DMC said.

While Sri Lanka depends on the seasonal monsoon rain for irrigation as well as hydroelectricity, experts have

warned that it faces more frequent floods as the world heats due to climate change.

The DMC said 20 out of the country's 25 districts were affected by heavy rain and issued warnings to people living on the banks of main rivers to move to higher ground.

Flights arriving at Colombo's main international airport were diverted to a smaller airport, and some key highways were flooded

at several exits.

The government also ordered all schools to remain shut on Monday after the weekend holiday, as more rain was forecast.

"There could be more heavy rains accompanied by strong winds and thunder," the DMC said.

Last week, wildlife authorities found seven carcasses of young elephants who drowned in the biggest single loss of the animals in five years.

Jail sentence will be a 'breaking point': Trump

Donald Trump has suggested that sending him to prison could prove a "breaking point" for his supporters – a warning that will fuel concerns of political violence around the U.S. presidential election on November 5.

In an interview aired Sunday on Fox News, the former President and current Republican White House hopeful acknowledged the possibility of jail time or house arrest following his historic criminal conviction in a hush money trial.

"I'm ok with it," Mr. Trump said, but added he was "not sure the public would stand for it." "I think it would be tough for the public to take. You know at a certain point there's a breaking point," he said.


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

असम-मणिपुर में भारी बारिश से बाढ़



गुवाहाटी, एजेन्सी। असम समेत पूर्वोत्तर के अधिकतर राज्यों में बाढ़ की स्थिति में कोई सुधार नहीं हुआ है और लाखों लोग इससे प्रभावित हुए हैं। अधिकारियों ने रविवार को यह जानकारी दी।

अधिकारियों ने बताया कि असम, मणिपुर व अन्य राज्यों में भारी बारिश के कारण नदियों का जलस्तर बढ़ गया। असम में कोपिली, बराक और कुशियारा नदियां खतरे के निशान से ऊपर बह रही हैं। बाढ़ के कारण हैलाकांडी होजाई, मोरीगांव, नागांव, कछार, डिब्रूगढ़ समेत अन्य जिलों में छह लाख लोग प्रभावित हुए हैं। अधिकारियों ने बताया कि 28 मई से अब तक बाढ़ और तूफान में मरने वालों की संख्या बढ़कर 15 हो गई है। कई इलाकों में सड़क और रेल संपर्क बाधित हो गया है। राज्य में 40,000 से अधिक लोगों ने राहत शिविरों में शरण ली है।

केरल में भारी बारिश, एर्णाकुलम में ऑरेंज अलर्ट: दक्षिण-पश्चिम मानसून के कारण केरल के विभिन्न हिस्सों में हो रही बारिश के बीच भारत मौसम विज्ञान विभाग (आईएमडी) ने रविवार को राज्य के एर्णाकुलम जिले में ऑरेंज अलर्ट जारी किया, जहां पिछले कई दिनों से लगातार बारिश हो रही है। दक्षिण-पश्चिम मानसून के कारण केरल के विभिन्न हिस्सों में हो रही है।

लखनऊ, बांदा, उरई और महोबा में तीन-तीन, कौशांबी, हमीरपुर-चित्रकूट, प्रयागराज, प्रतापगढ़ में दो-दो और रामपुर में एक की मौत हुई है। कानपुर में गर्मी से पांच और फतेहपुर में दो लोगों की जान गई है। बस्ती में एक अधिवक्ता की मौत हुई है। प्रतापगढ़ में आंधी-बारिश से चार लोगों की मौतें हुई हैं। बस्ती में एक अधिवक्ता की मौत हो गई है। महाराजगंज में

अगले तीन दिन कहीं लू तो कहीं आंधी और बारिश

मौसम विभाग के अनुसार, प्रदेश में अगले तीन दिन कहीं लू तो कहीं आंधी-बारिश की संभावना जताई गई है। इन तीन दिनों के मौसम के लिए आरेंज अलर्ट जारी किया गया है। इस दरम्यान पश्चिमी व पूर्वी अंचल में कुछ स्थानों पर लू और कुछ स्थानों पर आंधी-बारिश की संभावना है।

आंधी-पानी के दौरान किसान खेत पर अचेत होकर गिर गया और घर पर एक मौत हो गई। बुंदेलखंड में आंधी से दो की मौतें हुई हैं। इस तरह कुल 39 लोगों की मौतें हुई हैं।
