Cyclone Burevi weakens into deep depression

CHENNAI, DHNS: After making landfall in Sri Lanka, Cyclone Burevi weakened into a deep depression on Thursday night and will cross Ramanathapuram and Thoothukudi districts by the wee hours of Friday packing wind speeds of 50 to 60 kmph gusting to 70 kmph.

"It is very likely to weaken further into a Depression (wind speed 40-50kmph gusting to 60 kmph) by December 4 morning," the IMD said in its latest bulletin issued at 9 pm. Under the influence of the deep depression, Tamil Nadu and Kerala will receive rainfall at most places with heavy to very heavy rainfall at isolated places till Friday.

Before the cyclonic storm weakened into a deep depression, the Tamil Nadu government announced a public holiday for Kanyakumari, Tirunelveli, Tenkasi, Ramanathapuram, Virudhunagar, and Thoothukudi districts on Friday.

As rains pounded southern districts, flights from Thoothukudi to Chennai and Bengaluru were cancelled. More than 500 people in Rameswaram and Thoothukudi were moved to relief camps, while NDRF and state response teams are on the ground.

Union Home Minister Amit Shah spoke to Chief Ministers of Tamil Nadu and Kerala – Edappadi K Palaniswami and Pinarayi Vijayan and offered all assistance from the Centre.

Chennai experienced heavy rains through the night as over 3 cm rainfall was recorded till 8.30 am on Thursday. With six trees uprooted overnight, the number of trees fallen this monsoon season has gone up to 695.

Kerala remains on high alert

THIRUVANANTHAPURAM, DHNS: Kerala on Thursday heaved a sigh of relief in view of the forecast that the intensity of Cyclone Burevi may come down when it hits the state, even as the state continues to be on high alert,

Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan told reporters, after a review meeting, that as per the latest forecast there was no chance for major calamity in Kerala. But the disaster management agencies are remaining on a high alert, he said.



IMD predicts rain, snowfall in hills

NEW DELHI: Widespread rain and snow is likely over the Western Himalayan region from Monday due to a fresh western disturbance, the India Meteorological Department said on Sunday. The Met department has predicted widespread rain and snow over Jammu and Kashmir, Ladakh, Gilgit-Baltistan, Muzaffarabad, Himachal Pradesh between December 7 and 9, and scattered rain over Uttarakhand between December 8 and 9. Kashmir experienced a dry but cold weather with Baltal being recorded as the coldest place in the valley at minus 4.8 degrees Celsius. Gulmarg recorded a low of minus 3.0 degrees Celsius on Saturday night.

A yellow alert avalanche warning has been issued for higher reaches of several districts in J&K by the Disaster Management Authority, news agency ANI reported on Sunday.

"We are expecting moderate snowfall in the higher reaches of Western Himalayas but some parts may also record heavy snowfall starting tomorrow (Monday). But minimum temperature will not fall significantly immediately because another WD is likely to impact the region around December 12 and 13. There is likely to be clouding associated with the WDs which inhibits radiational cooling," said Kuldeep Shrivastava, head, regional weather forecasting centre.

Seven die as heavy rain hits TN

CHENNAI: Heavy rains continued to batter Tamil Nadu on Friday leading to death of seven people and waterlogging in many parts even as the deep depression over Gulf of Mannar near Ramanathapuram weakened into a depression, officials familiar with the matter said.

The India Meteorological Department said the deep depression over the Gulf of Mannar close to Ramanathapuram district's coast remained practically stationary for 18 hours and then weakened into a depression.

"The depression is likely to remain practically stationary over the same (Ramanathapuram) region and weaken into a Well marked Low Pressure Area during the next 12 hours (by early Saturday)," the latest bulletin said.

A total of 27,391 people including 4,873 children have been evacuated and moved to relief camps across the state. The high-water levels have caused severe damage to crops as more than 40 hectares of paddy were damaged, officials familiar with the matter said.

According to the Indian Meteorological Department's Ipm bulletin, the deep depression is likely to remain stationary over the same region and weaken into a depression during the next 12 hours and move southwestwards across

Ramanathapuram district towards south Kerala and weaken into a well-marked low pressure area in subsequent 24 hours.

Chief minister Edappadi Palaniswami had announced a public holiday on December 4 for Kanyakumari, Tirunelveli, Tenkasi, Ramanathapuram, Virudhunagar and Thoothukudi and urged people to remain indoors.

Chief minister of Puducherry V Narayanaswami inspected flooded-areas and civic workers and machines were pressed to drain water. The union territory had declared a holiday for schools in the union territory.

SHIMLA, DECEMBER 6

Cold wave conditions persisted in most parts of the state, even as the weather remained dry and minimum and maximum temperatures fluctuated marginally. The local MeT office has predicted rain or snow at isolated places in mid and higher hills from December 7 to December 10 and rain and thunder showers in lower hills on December 8 and 9.

A fresh Western disturbance is likely to affect the Western Himalayan Region from tomorrow, causing rain and snow in the region, the MeT office said.

The minimum temperatures rose marginally and stayed two to five degree above normal and the mercury rose to -1.7 degree Celcius at Keylong in tribal Lahaul and Spiti district, which was coldest in the region. Kalpa in tribal Kinnaur district recoded a low of zero degree while Manali registered minimum temperature at 5.6 degree, five degree above normal, followed by Kufri 5.8 degree, Bhuntar 6.4 degree, Solan and Sundernagar degree, Una 7.7 degree, Shimla 8.1 degree and Dharamsala 8.4 degree.

The maximum day temperatures remained steady.

Expect rain, snow from Dec 7

SHIMLA, DECEMBER 4

Severe cold wave conditions gripped most parts of Himachal as night temperatures hovered around the freezing point at many places while Shimla and Dharamsala were warmer compared to other places in lower hills.

Keylong in tribal Lahaul and Spiti district froze at minus 6.7°C while Kalpa and Manali shivered at 0.1°C and 2°C. The local MeT office has predicted rain or snowfall at

isolated places in higher hills from December 7 to 10 and in mid hills on December 7 and 8, as a fresh western disturbance is likely to affect northwest India from December 7.

Several places in lower hills reeled under piercing cold wave conditions as the mercury dropped by a few notches. Bhuntar recorded a low of 2.5°C, followed by Sundernagar 2.8°C, Solan and Mandi 4°C, and Palampur 5.5°C. However, Shimla and

Dharamsala were warmer with a low of 9.9°C and 8.2°C, followed by Dalhousie 7.9°C and Kufri 7.7°C.

The weather remained dry in the region. Una was the hottest during the day with a high of 25.8°C, followed by Solan 23°C and Sundernagar 22.7°C. While Keylong in Lahaul and Spiti recorded the maximum temperature of 4.2°C, Kalpa in Kinnaur district was warmer with a high of 13.2°C. — TNS
