In the meeting

Overnight rain showers misery on Kalyana K'taka districts

Heavy rain on the intervening night of Tuesday and Wednesday has damaged vast tracts of standing crops in Kalaburagi, Bidar, Yadgir and Raichur districts.

The region has been receiving incessant rain for the past two days. Kalaburagi city and many parts of the districts, including Chittapur, Kalagi, Wadi, Afzalpur and Kamalapur, experienced spells of heavy rain through the day on Wednesday.

Kagina and Manjra rivers, many rivulets and streams in Kalaburagi and Bidar districts are in spate. With Kagina river submerging the bridge between Ingalagi and Shahabad, traffic on the route has been affected badly. The swollen Kagina has inundated acres of farmland in the district.

A bridge near Evani village in Chittapur taluk of Kalaburagi district goes under an overflowing stream.

The overflowing Manjra river has triggered flood fears in the villages on its banks. Many villages in Aurad taluk are facing a flood-like situation. Kamalnagar in Bidar district has received a whopping 220 mm (22 CM) of rain in the last 24 hours (ending 8 am on Wednesday)

Overnight showers have

damaged cotton, tur and paddy crops in Raichur taluk. A minor railway bridge between Shaktinagar and Kaadluru has been flooded. Copious rain has left many houses and acres of farmland waterlogged in Shahpur taluk of Yadgir district.

Meanwhile, Hosapete and Hagaribommanahalli taluks continued to receive

sporadic spells of heavy rain. The Danayakanakere lake near Mariyammanahalli has breached on Wednesday as the spillover flooded acres of the jowar crop in the lake vicinity.

Many pushkarinis in the Unesco world heritage site Hampi, including the one en route Vijaya Vittala Temple, have come alive following torrential rain in the region in recent past.

Kottigehara in Chikkamagaluru and parts of Udupi district received heavy showers while parts of Bagalkot, Gadag, Davangere, Shivamogga and Dakshina Kannada witnessed mild to moderate rainfall.

Fishing boat sinks

Twenty-nine crew and fishermen were rescued from the fishing boat 'Hanumatheertha' that sank in Arabian Sea off Malpe coast on Tuesday night.

Heavy rain in Kerala, IMD issues red alert

NEW DELHI, SEPTEMBER 19

The India Meteorological Department (IMD) issued a 'red alert' for extremely heavy rainfall for Kerala's three districts on Saturday, while dry weather conditions prevailed in Delhi for the eleventh consecutive day.

The Met Department said low-pressure brewing over the Bay of Bengal is likely to trigger rainfall across West Bengal from Sunday. Uttar Pradesh witnessed light to moderate rains at isolated places over the state, it said. — PTI

Heavy rains pummel Bidar, Kalaburagi districts, normal life affected

Hheavy rain continued to pummel Bidar and parts of Kalaburagi districts through the day on Thursday, flooding crops on thousands of acres in the region.

Six road bridges in the rain-battered Bidar district have gone under the overflowing Manjra river and streams. Bhalki, Aurad and Basavakalyan taluks are the worst-hit.

The swollen Manjra river has meandered its way through to the farmland and villages located on its floodplains.

With Godavari river catchment areas receiving incessant showers, inflow into Karanja reservoir near Byalahalli in Bhalki taluk has increased drastically.

The reservoir has received more than one-and-a-half times of water in the last three to four days. Bridges at Belakuni and Daadgi in Kamalnagar taluk and Bagadal in Bidar taluk have been submerged.

Relentless showers have brought life to a standstill in Bidar city on Thursday. The showers left the low-lying areas in the old city, CMC Colony, Vidyanagar, Lumbininagar, Rotary Circle waterlogged.

Many parts of the city plunged into darkness after the skies opened up on Wednesday

evening. Heavy rain lashed Kalaburagi city in spells through the day on Thursday. However, the showers stayed away during an event to mark Kalyana Karnataka Utsav (HK Liberation Day), attended by Chief Minister BS Yediyurappa.

The Belakota reservoir (Gandori Nala) in Kamalapur taluk of Kalaburagi district has reached its full reservoir level (1,467.50 feet).

Several bridges in Sedam, Kalagi and Chittapur taluks, including the one between Chincholi and Bidar on state highway 15, went under the overflowing Kagina river, bringing the traffic in the region to a standstill.

Chincholi received a record 18 cm of rain in the 24 hours (ending 8 am on Thursday). Bidar city recorded 12.1 cm while

Basava Kalyan registered 7.4 cm of rain.

Women stranded

A woman and her daughter were forced to take shelter on the rooftop of their farmhouse following a flash flood at Rachappa Goudgaon in Bidar district. They spent five hours on the rooftop waiting for help. After the floodwater in the stream subsided, the police, joined by firemen, rescued the women. Meanwhile, Hosapete taluk, including the Unesco world heritage site Hampi, continued to receive sporadic spells of heavy rain.

Several Mumbai-Karnataka districts, including Bagalkot, Vijayapura and Belagavi, experienced good rainfall on Thursday. Agasthya Thirtha pond in Badami is full to the brim.

Gescom AE washed away in swollen stream

An assistant engineer of Gulbarga Electricity Supply Company Limited (Gescom) washed away in a swollen stream between Vajjapura-Bammanalli villages of Aland taluk, Kalaburagi district, on Thursday evening.

The incident occurred when Siddarama Danappa Avate, the Gescom AE at Afzalpur, was trying to cross the stream in a car.

Rajashankar Basavaraj Kumbhar, who accompanied the engineer, swam to safety. The search operation is underway from Afzalpur-Dhudani side of the stream.

Heavy rain lashes Udupi, Dakshina Kannada districts

Normal life severely affected; floodwaters from Indrani rivulet enter Rajangana on Sri Krishna Math premises

Life was severely affected in the Udupi and Dakshina Kannada districts of Karnataka as heavy rain continued to lash the coastal belt for the second straight day on Sunday.

Eight persons were injured and more than 1,100 houses and public properties were damaged in the Udupi and Dakshina Kannada districts. There was no loss of life.

Some parts of Udupi city and houses in low-lying areas in 77 villages in the district were the worst hit as the region witnessed unprecedented rain and floods in decades.

Floodwaters from the overflowing Indrani rivulet at Kalsanka in Udupi city entered the Rajangana on Sri Krishna Math premises. The entire parking area of the

mnut was submerged. The four-lane Udupi-Manipal Road was flooded and water entered some shops and houses in the Kalsanka area. According to B. Sadashiva Prabhu, Additional Deputy Commissioner, 2,874 people from 827 affected families had been evacuated in Udupi district till the evening. As many as 1,107 houses were damaged and 1,201 people,

including 563 women, were housed in 31 relief camps. Others took shelter in the houses of relatives. The worst-affected villages/areas were in Udupi, Kapu, and Brahmavar taluks.

Road traffic hit
Traffic on the Udupi-Manipal-Hebri-Shivamogga Road was affected after floodwaters cut off connectivity at

Puthige. Hence, traffic was diverted through other routes, Mr. Prabhu said.

Around 25 houses were damaged in rain in Dakshina Kannada. Six persons were injured in a landslip near Vihla in Bantwal taluk, and two others in another landslip at Saripalla in Mangaluru.

Water from the Shanbhavi entered the premises of the Bappanadu Durgaparameshwari temple in Mulki.

There was a landslip on the bypass railway line between the Konkan Railway network and the South Western Railway network, near Padil, in Mangaluru. It completely covered the track, affecting movement between Konkan Railway and Hassan/Mysuru/Bengaluru. There was a landslip on Adyapadi Road near the Mangaluru International Airport in Kenjar village on the outskirts of Mangaluru.

Orange alert issued by Met Dept. in Kerala

Heavy rainfall is likely to continue in Kerala till Tuesday under the influence of a low pressure area in the Bay of Bengal.

The India Meteorological Department (IMD) has put 10 central and northern districts on orange alert for Monday, given the possibility of isolated heavy to very heavy rainfall. The districts are Kottayam, Ernakulam, Idukki, Thrissur, Palakkad, Malappuram, Kozhikode, Wayanad, Kannur and Kasaragod.

Kollam, Pathanamthitta and Alappuzha have been put on yellow alert, for like-



ly isolated heavy rainfall. With heavy rainfall continuing in central and north Kerala districts, three teams of the National Disaster Response Force arrived in the State on Sunday for tackling rain-related contingencies.

They had been deployed in Wayanad, Malappuram and Thrissur, the Kerala State Disaster Management Authority said. Two NDRF teams were positioned in Idukki and Kozhikode. "The southwest monsoon is very strong in Kerala under the influence of a low pressure area," K. Santhosh, Director, IMD Meteorological Centre, Thiruvananthapuram, said.
