Cry in vain in Mumbai: 'Pull me out'

Mumbai: The heart-wrenching but futile entreaty of a teenager—"mujhe bahar nikalo (pull me out)—bore testimony to the stricken status of Mumbai after rain wreaked havoc in the financial capital in the past 24 hours.

As many as 35 people have died in the state in rain-related incidents since Monday night. The monsoon rain was described as the worst in a single day in 14 years.

Among the casualties was Sanchita Ganore, 15. For close to 12 hours, Sanchita kept pleading to pull her out, her legs trapped in the debris of a wall that had collapsed.

When Sanchita could finally be brought out on Tuesday afternoon, she had breathed her last. Eighteen others died in the wall collapse at Malad, a congested north Mumbai suburb.

A doctor at the spot said a medical team had tried its best but couldn't save Sanchita. "Her legs were stuck in the debris, so it took long to rescue her. We tried our best to bring her out alive but could not," he said.

A rescue worker said Sanchita had been crying for help and asking for water. "Shortly after the wall collapsed, we rescued a child from underneath the debris. Sanchita had been crying for help since 2am," the worker said. "She kept pleading 'mujhe bahar nikalo'," he added.

Sanchita's faint voice could be heard calling out for water to drink. Efforts were made to cut a small section of the wall and clear a path for the girl to come out. But it was too late.

A mother and child were found alive with the help of life-sensing equipment and sniffer dogs, according to a tweet by the Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC).

"Water was getting accumulated since it began raining heavily several hours ago. It created massive pressure on the wall and it soon gave way," an eyewitness said.

People gathered at the site were seen discussing the ownership of the wall. While some claimed it belonged to the forest department, others said the BMC was the owner. A few others said the wall had been erected by a private company.

Several residents expressed anger at political parties, accusing them of ignoring them after elections.

Fifteen people were killed in Pune on Saturday when a portion of a 22ft-high compound wall of a housing society collapsed on adjoining shanties following heavy rainfall.

Calcutta flights

From Calcutta, several flights to and from Mumbai were cancelled or delayed. Airport officials said three flights from Mumbai to Calcutta were cancelled and six delayed by several hours on Tuesday. Three Mumbai-bound flights were cancelled and nine delayed.

Monsoon reaches hills of North India

May hit Haryana, Chandigarh in 48 hours

NEW DELHI, IULY 3

The Met Department has said conditions are becoming favourable for arrival of southwest monsoon over parts of Haryana, Chandigarh and Delhi in the next 48 hours.

While rains in the region are likely on July 5-6, "typical monsoon conditions" can only be expected next week, around July 10", says Mahesh Palawat, vice-president, meteorology and climate change, Skymet.

"Monsoon has reached hills of the North, easterly winds have started and during the next two days thunder activity and rain can be expected in plains of the northwest. An increase in rain activity is also expected on July 5-6," he says.

According to the IMD's latest forecast, monsoon further advanced into some more parts of Gujarat, Rajasthan, Madhya Pradesh and Uttar Pradesh. The northern limit of monsoon (NLM) is currently passing through Dwarka,

Deesa, Udaipur, Kota, Gwalior, Shahjahanpur, Najibabad and Mandi.

A well-marked low pressure area over north Chhattisgarh and adjoining areas of Jharkhand and Odisha and associated cyclonic circulation extending up to 7.6 km continues to persist. With its likely west-northwestward movement, conditions are becoming favourable for further advance of the seasonal rains into remaining parts of CONTINUED ON PAGE 14

north Arabian Sea, Gujarat, Madhya Pradesh, some more parts of Rajasthan, Himachal Pradesh, Jammu and Kashmir, remaining parts of Uttar Pradesh and some parts of Haryana, Chandigarh and Delhi during the next 48 hours.

Fairly widespread rain with isolated very heavy rainfall can also be expected over west coast, east and northeast, Uttar Pradesh, Himachal Pradesh and Uttarakhand between July 8 and 10.

However, plains of the northwest, which include Punjab, Haryana and Chandigarh, are not likely to receive well-distributed rain this season. "Though Delhi can receive normal rain, same cannot be said about Punjab, Haryana and Chandigarh," he says.

Nine persons, including women and children, died after a small dam at Chiplun in Maharashtra's Ratnagiri district gave way on Tuesday night following heavy rain.

The mishap occurred a little before 10 pm. Thirteen houses downstream the dam, filled to the brim, were washed away while six villages were flooded.

Timely action by the district administration ensured 3,000 villagers were moved to higher places, officials said. The dam was built around 15 years ago by a company

owned by local Shiv Sena MLA Sadanand Chavan.

While 10 bodies were recovered by noon, at least 18 persons have been reported missing. "We are carrying out searches," said Irrigation Minister Girish Mahajan, adding repairs were conducted after villagers complained

of the structure developing cracks two years ago.

The MLA told reporters that after complaints of leaks four-five months ago, he had warned Irrigation Department officials to carry out repairs. "If repair work was done, it appears to be of poor quality," said Chavan.

Meanwhile, Opposition Congress and NCP accused the government of not carrying out structural audits on bridges and dams, several of which have collapsed in the past few months. — TNS
